

doing the same, or at least it might be on your mind. What Christmas shows and markets are worth applying for, what might be the trends for the season and what might sell well? I do admit that I like a bit of planning ahead ①.

Talking of planning – our annually AGM will be held at the Only Clay exhibition on Sunday, 25th September 2022 from 2 pm at Only Clay Ceramics Fair, Kelham Island Museum, Alma Street in Sheffield (S3 8SA). Refreshments will be provided and you will get the chance to meet the committee members and our regional coordinators. Amongst other things, we will be talking about the ongoing preparations for our Potters Camp 2023 and we will have some time for networking. I hope to see you there.

From this AGM our longstanding secretary Sally Steuli will be stepping down and I would like to say a big Thank you to Sally for all her hard work. So far, we have not found a new secretary and I would like to ask all of you if you can spare a few hours to help with the smooth running of the NPA. That said, we were successful in recruiting a new Vice Chair, so please welcome Lynne Rose.

Finally, I would like to remind you about our bursary scheme. This has been developed to enable our members to access NPA funds directly and is funded from excess funds that are not required for the running of the NPA. For 2022/23 the total is £1,000 and we are happy to support you to develop aspects of your ceramic work, or the funds could be used for (but not restricted to) items such as training courses, workshops, networking, and travel costs. You have to be an NPA member for at least a vear and bursaries will be awarded on a first come first served basis, up to a value of £250. Applications need to be submitted to the NPA treasurer (treasurer@northern-potters.co.uk) and we consider all applications at quarterly intervals during our committee meetings. Go Big or Go Home at Potfest in the Pens - Part 1

Geoff Cox has a simple idea - three days to make something big out of 50kg of crank clay. A great opportunity for potters to be playful on a grand scale. At Potfest in the Pens at Penrith this year it was put into action, with seventeen potters taking part. This is the first instalment of reports from the participants.

The reasons for joining the NPA are many and varied but the primary one is undoubtedly a desire to share a passion for making in clay. It has now the biggest membership of all the potters' associations and is located near the geographical centre of the UK with its mixture of vibrant city and wild open countryside. It could be the most dynamic association in the country.

I've long thought that the UK really needed a focal point for ceramics, a recognised centre for all things clay. Eventually I've come to the conclusion that if anything is to develop, it will have to come from the grass roots - potters will make it happen. It doesn't require a prestigious building, bricks and mortar are inert and sterile, the creative energy of potters and a desire to see it NOW will make it happen. Inevitably you just have to make a start and see where it goes.

Over the years Potfest has become something of a potters' rendezvous, each year around 100 potters gather at Potfest in the Pens, [the first potters' market in the UK], partly to sell their work but also

to spend time in each others' company. It's become a sort of a support group, as attested by everyone who's taken part; friendships have developed and it's created a strong and inclusive feeling of family. The energy already exists to make something bigger happen - a good place to make a start. This year 16 NPA members joined the event using the venue for a hands-on Potters' Playtime project alongside the exhibitors. Go Big or Go Home.

The idea was to spend the three days, each making one large piece using four bags of clay, 50 kilos. Everyone way out of their comfort zone - who dares wins. There are already plans to do something similar next year but on a much larger scale. Could this be the start of an annual interactive event with potters working alongside each other, a focus for creativity in clay? The following are the thoughts of some of this year's NPA Playtime Potters who took part.

Pam Locker – Oh my god – what was I thinking. I really don't know where to start and haven't given myself enough time to think, let alone plan! Too much clay and what is that funny smell?

Day 1 was the greatest challenge, the clay was too soft and the ambition too great. But help from fellow 'internees' really helped and clay armatures to support from the inside gave little glimmers of hope. Probably spent too much time chatting and looking at lovely work! Still two bags to go....

Day 2 [final day for me] — suddenly the sun came out and slabs could be left to firm up. A rush to finish meant some poor decisions — particularly in terms of the base of the sculpture but on the plus side, I had used all four bags of clay and didn't get sent home.

The pleasure of the process kept me going throughout but the valuable lessons learnt will make me go back and start all over again at home.

Graham Northing - The thought of working with 50kg of clay was a bit daunting at first, but once the idea of the big castle thingy had crystallised it all went well. In fact much better than I had anticipated. And the

time! It just went by so fast! With making and chatting to passing public it just disappeared. I will definitely be putting my name forward for the next one, a really great event.

Jill Ford – My usual work is thrown porcelain, so making something large, sculptural and handbuilt from grogged stoneware is definitely beyond my comfort zone. I've always had a hankering to make tall skinny pots. My garden will be my source of inspiration, Red hot Pokers, Lupins, Irises. In my mind's eye it will look splendid – but maybe it'll end up as a glorious heap of clay on a cow shed floor. All part of the fun – I think.

Day 1 – Today's flower, a Red Hot Poker – 1.2 meters high. Progress is slow while I get my head round the construction. I love the way the thin cone shaped petals simply flop en masse on top of each other and I'm liking the rhythm of making multiples.


Day 2 – Today's flower is a hollyhock type of form, reaching near 2meters. Getting the hang of construction now though only used half a bag; everyone else seems to have used up their allotted four. I'm playing with contrasts – rough textured crank clay pinched finely, seeking a balance between something large yet delicate.

Day 3 – A quick 2 hours to produce the third flower – going more impulsive now, prodding, boring and making holes in the seed heads. Feeling a bit guilty after only using one bag of clay.

What did I learn? – not to be restrained by making the flowers look real but to let ideas evolve and go a little more crazy than my normal work. A liberating experience.

To begin with fellow potters were names I was vaguely familiar with, by the end they have now become friends and I feel much more part of a potters' community.

Holding the Playtime at Potfest in the Pens had the advantage of makers feeling part of an even bigger event. Joining in the mug swap, the potters' meal and spending time around the fire pit together at the campsite. If sharing a passion for clay is the primary objective a hands-on project with everyone out of their comfort zone but helping each other to move forward has to be the best bonding exercise for anyone playing with clay. Coming together once a year to make the North a Mecca for makers would create a focus for ceramics, not in the form of a posh building for the great and good but as a potters' party like no other, with everyone welcome. When potters come together en masse interesting things can happen. Long may it continue. - Geoff

Steve and myself have shared studios, exhibition stands and co-presented workshops but never worked on a piece together, so we decided to take on the 50 kilo challenge and make a collaborative piece.

We had a very basic, roughly drawn plan, an intention to keep building upwards, for it to be self supporting and then see how it goes.

Neither of us had any idea of what the finished piece would look like, but knew we wanted it to have some type of surface design and texture and were open minded to the clay slumping and taking on its own form.

This meant there was no pressure or stress, just the opportunity to make something big with clay, with a great bunch of people also making something big with clay.

For Steve and myself, knowing we weren't going to transport or fire our sculpture meant it was stress free and we could just enjoy what the clay was doing.

We used 5 bags of clay (Crank), were really happy with the finished piece and remained friends the whole time.

At the end of the weekend, we cut up our approximately 4.5ft sculpture, squashed most of the pieces and put the clay back in the bags and although not our original intention, I

kept four pieces, dried them slowly and have fired and glazed one.

It was a really good weekend at Potfest in the Pens, it was inspiring and fun and great to be part of a big project.

With painter parents, Chris inherited artist's genes and was a professional potter from an early age, continuously exhibiting for 62 years. Chris attended Harrogate School of Art followed by Slade School and the London Institute of Education. He then gained a diploma in Postgraduate Ceramics at Central School in London and worked as a studio assistant at the Briglin Pottery under Bridget Appleby and Eileen Lewenstein. Chris had been an educator for many years, including serving as Head of Ceramics at Manchester Metropolitan University.

A lifelong student of historical Ceramics, involved with archeological digs and continuous research into glaze technology. He was an inspirational teacher, generous friend and mentor to so many in the world of clay.

A great friend to our organisation, our thoughts are with Chris's family.

Bouncing Back Fund

NPA fund for access by NPA members 2022 - 2024

We are excited to announce a unique opportunity for NPA members to apply for funding from the NPA "Bouncing back fund".





Background:

The NPA is committed to supporting the exchange of ideas, opinions, and sharing of information on and about ceramics as well as promoting those activities to stimulate a wider and more informed appreciation of ceramics among both the members and the general public.

Due to the Covid pandemic and the lack of opportunities for events and exhibitions, the NPA Committee decided to use a total of £5000 over a period of 2 years to support its members in organizing and running of events, exhibitions, etc which are designed to further the educational and recreational aspects of ceramics.

Who can access it?

- NPA members as individuals, groups, areas, or regions
- What are the criteria for applying?
- The event shall be open to all (not just NPA members) and needs to be pottery related
- Activities need to appeal to potters such as demonstrations, exhibitions, potters camps, raku, learning opportunities, sharing of good practice demonstrations, etc
- · Activities shall bring positive publicity to the work of NPA members and the NPA
- · Activities should intend to build future momentum
- The applicant agrees to share their information with the NPA before the event to support the marketing and after the event as part of a newsletter article

Applications to be received by 31st December 2022 using the application form:

- Applications will be reviewed by the NPA committee taking into account the criteria above
- Applications will be accepted after the 31st December 2022 although applicants should note that the funds may be allocated at that point.

Guidance notes:

- The event can take place outside of the funding period to acknowledge how long it can take to set up a large event
- · Part funding of an event is welcome
- NPA can fund revenue and capital costs associated with an activity
- · Activities do not have to make a surplus
- Any surplus made is to be repaid to the NPA
- Any unspent funds to be repaid to the NPA
- Applications can include money spent on vital support, for example, admin, social media as well as room hire and cost for demonstrations
- Payments in relation to spending must be accompanied by a receipt and will be paid via the NPA treasurer (either on an expenses claim form from the grant recipient or direct to the supplier)
- Attendance/sales receipts are to be paid to the NPA bank account
- · Successful applicants will be notified via email.

Biscuit fired bowls were made and supplied by some of the gallery exhibitors.

Hare Hill Barn has a beautiful gallery space - see pictures - but it would not have been financially viable to exhibit there without the paying customers who took part in the raku firing. This financial model seems to be a good one in that the paying raku event subsidised the gallery hire and took the pressure off exhibitors by reducing the cost.

The Celebrating Ceramics Experience – Chris Barnes

There was a healthy contingent of NPA members exhibiting at Celebrating Ceramics this year and we all got very hot!

The Oxfordshire countryside felt like a foreign land in the heat which the uninterupted sunlight poured down on 14 July. Set up days are always potentially testing as you discover the lay of the land under your display and the look of all the other displays in your tent. Add cars queuing to get onto the show enclosure, the high temperatures and dust rising from the track down to the camping field to this, and you get the picture.

One of the good things about showing out in the open is that if you come prepared you can put your pots on plinths outside the tents and considerably extend your effective selling space. As any supermarket manager will tell you - if you give a product more shelf space its sales will increase. And the work looked great in the sunshine!




